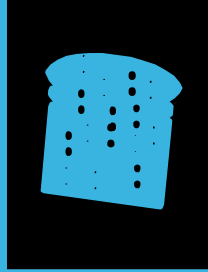
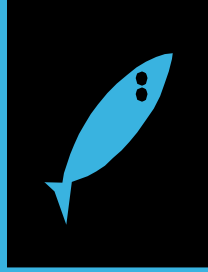

### Listeria monocytogenes

Eating food contaminated with *Listeria monocytogenes* bacteria causes listeriosis—a serious infection that primarily affects individuals who are at a high risk for food poisoning: older adults, pregnant women, young children and people with weakened immune systems. *Listeria* can grow at refrigerator temperatures where most other bacteria cannot.

**Causes:** *Listeria* is found in refrigerated, ready-to-eat foods, such as hot dogs and deli meats, unpasteurized milk and dairy products, and raw and undercooked meat, poultry and seafood.

**Prevention:** Cook all foods to proper temperatures and reheat pre-cooked foods to 165°F; wash raw fruit and vegetables before peeling, cutting or eating; separate uncooked meats and poultry from foods that are already cooked or ready-to-eat; wash hands thoroughly; store foods safely at appropriate temperatures; and maintain a clean refrigerator, kitchen area and wash reusable grocery totes regularly.

The first step in the E-waste recycling process is dismantling.

Initial dismantling is completed by hand on assets such as computers, monitors, televisions and other similar equipment that is easily taken apart. This produces the highest degree of material separation possible.

Dismantling involves removing the following:

- Hard Drives, printed circuit boards, motherboards
- Light and dark plastics (exterior housings and interior components)
- Wooden cabinets from TVs
- Ferrous metals
- Aluminum and other nonferrous metals
- Wire
- Copper yokes from CRTs
- And more!

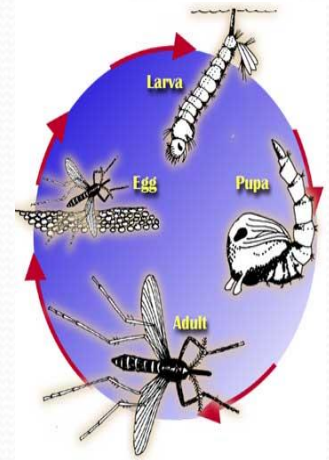

### Mosquito Fast Facts

1. In the interest of science, Arctic researchers uncovered their chests, arms, and legs and reported as many as 9000 mosquito bites per person, per minute. At this rate, and unprotected human would lose one half of his blood supply in approximately 2 hours.
2. Some people are more attractive to mosquitoes than others. It is not clear why, but probably has something to do with the 300 odd chemicals produced by the skin.
3. A mosquito can smell the carbon dioxide you exhale from about 60 to 75 feet away.
4. Most mosquitoes do not fly very far from their larval habitat, but the salt marsh mosquito migrates 75 to 100 miles over the course of its life.
